Since the publication of the Prevent Strategy, there has been an awareness of the specific need to safeguard children, pupils and families from violent extremism. There have been attempts to radicalise vulnerable children and pupils to hold extreme views including views justifying political, religious, sexist or racist violence, or to steer	
them into a rigid and narrow ideology that is intolerant of diversity and leaves them vulnerable to future radicalisation. The purpose of this risk assessment is to identify areas of risk at Bledlow Ridge School and put protective measures in place.
